

LEADING THE WAY!

Brother David Andersen '07 Shares His Tales of How He Led Georgia Tech Students as Last Year's Undergraduate President of the Student Government Association

Hailing from Duluth, GA, Brother David Andersen '07 is pursuing a degree in Manage-ment and Certificates in Finance and Land Development. David shares a bit about his experience as the Undergraduate President of the Student Government Association (SGA).

- Q: Tell us a bit about your experience as SGA president.
- A: It was an incredible experience, and one that I will never forget. With the help of my SGA colleagues, I was able to fulfill many of my campaign promises, including the successful implementation of a new online student ticketing system for Varsity Men's Basketball.

Additionally, I was fortunate enough to serve on several campus-wide search committees, including the AD Search, which required that our committee travel all the way to a Dallas, TX hotel to conduct interviews and select finalists over a three day period. One of the best parts of this job, though, was the people that I got to meet along the way. Besides the many great friend-ships that I was able to foster with students across campus, I also devel-oped close working relationships with many high-level administrators and key alums that play a vital role in the creation and implementation of Tech's strategic plan.

- Q: What was the most challenging part?
- A: The most challenging part of my term was trying to mitigate conflict, especially when it was brewing between student groups that had opposing points of view on complex issues. The new Georgia Tech

has a larger international population and appears more politically diverse than the Institute of several decades ago. This, in turn, has created a campus environment in which there are more conflicting opinions, and there is an increasing level of public debate, over highly controversial issues. Through my role as SGA President, I learned the importance of being open-minded at all times, regardless of the issue. And while I have distinct personal views on some of the issues Tech encountered during my term, I tried not to let my personal bias distract me from recognizing that all student groups should be able to express themselves freely, regardless of their stance on an issue. I became a strong advocate for those student groups that felt underrepresented or limited in their ability to freely express their opinions, and I began to lobby the administration for an increasing number of campus- wide dialogues on the very issues in which there appeared to be growing campus conflict.

- Q: Did anything surprising or unexpected happen during your term?
- A: My term was filled with many unexpected events. Probably the biggest surprise was at the beginning of the fall, when Hurricane Katrina hit the Gulf Coast, and we quickly discovered that Tech would be hosting refugees in the Coliseum. Instead of going to the away game at Auburn, I spent my weekend working alongside Red Cross volunteers, the Dean of Students staff, the GT Police, students, and others to try and help those who had lost their homes, possessions, and even loved-ones as a result of this devastating hurricane. This experience helped me to put things in perspective, and it taught me just how service-oriented Tech students, faculty, and staff are. This reaffirmed my belief that Georgia Tech is one of the greatest institutions in the nation, both

- inside and outside of the classroom.
- Q: What are some of the things you accomplished during your term?
- A: Several of SGA's biggest accomplishments during my term as President included the implementation of a priority-based online ticketing system for Varsity Men's Basketball, the creation of a weekend Stinger route from GT to Atlantic Station, and the establish-ment of an institute-wide steering committee to reevaluate academic advising across campus. Additionally, during my term, SGA got the ball rolling on an initiative to bring free music downloading to all students (recently enacted under the new President). We created a partnership with GT Legal and the State Attorney General's office to overhaul SGA's Joint Finance Policies (bringing our student activity fee allocation process into compliance with the latest state and federal case law), and we played a key role in developing a more equitable campus-wide priority registration process.
- Q: You were the second KA in 5 years to serve as SGA president. Did this have a positive effect on recruitment for KA at GA Tech?
- A: I think it probably did help; I'm just not sure how much. This fall semester was one of the strongest rushes KA has had in a long time, as we ended up with a solid number of well-rounded pledges who are fun to be around and who I see going very far in life. Ultimately, I think the biggest factors that helped with KA's successful rush included the dedication of our rush chairs, our chapter leadership, and the active brothers who so successfully sold incoming freshmen on what it means to be a KA, and why the chapter's strong brotherhood and commitment to developing leaders among men is really what separates us from the rest.


