Clint Newton '45, Charter Member of KA Alumni Council, Leads a Life of Service

Clinton (Clint) Newton '45 has led a full life in his 83 years. His most cherished and lasting memories always refer to being of service to others, a legacy that began at the Alpha Sigma Chapter. A family friend recommended Clint to the KAs. Clint liked what he saw, pledged and was initiated in April 1945.

"I was from a small town and didn't really know much about fraternities, but I really liked the guys [at KA] whom I met and hung out with at parties. They were all really great guys," Clint said.

He went on to graduate with the class of 1949. Originally scheduled to sit with the class of '48, like so many other young men at that time, his academic career was interrupted by World War II.

"I joined the Navy aviation program in 1945, and one week later Japan surrendered," he says.

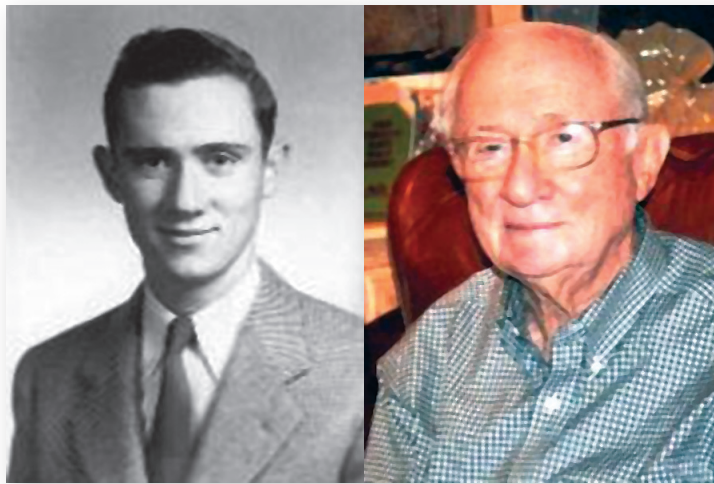
However, he served in active duty for another three and a half years as part of the Airborne Early Warning System reading radars aboard Navy PB1W planes, the cutting edge of technology at the time. After his tour was finished, he was greeted with a warm reception from his brothers at the house.

"Most of the guys at KA were returning veterans," he says, reinforcing the added camaraderie of the brothers during wartime.

In 1951, Clint rejoined the Navy for the Korean War and later served in the Reserves in Atlanta, eventually being promoted to Commander before retiring after 20 years of service.

Passing On a Legacy of Service

In 1972, KA National saw a need for an Advisory Council for Alpha Sigma. At that time, KA had its headquarters in Atlanta. The Council (later changed to the Alpha Sigma Alumni Council) was started with Clint, **Bobby Austin '43**, **Jack Alexander '45**, **Dan McNeil '43**, **Bob Rice '46** and **John Ford '49**. Clint served on the Council for more than 20 years, and proudly watched the committee and brotherhood grow and

strengthen around him.

"I had fond memories of my time at Georgia Tech," he asserts. "Once I got involved, it was interesting enough and I saw a need there, so I just did what I could to help."

He and Jack Alexander were some of the staunchest supporters of the chapter, and both served as alumni advisors for over 15 years.

Clint's contributions to the chapter culminated into receiving the highest honor bestowed upon any brother, the Knight Commander's Accolade, in 1991. He was also inducted into the Hardeman Province Court of Honor in 1994, in recognition of his service to the fraternity.

Clint expands his motto of service to organizations outside of KA as well. After the death of his wife, Pat, he moved to Franklin, Tenn. to be near his two daughters Kim and Karen (notice that Karen starts with "KA") and two grandchildren. But before moving, he also served on the Kiwanis Club and the Optimist Club in Atlanta, both dedicated to helping young people.

His passion for helping others also formed a lasting impression on his children. His daughter Karen and her husband Steve, who have an autistic son, started and ran the Autism Foundation of Tennessee, which is now one of the largest autism centers in the center of the state. The foundation currently employs 25 therapists to work with its 70 enrolled children.

As far as his daughter is concerned, Clint notes, "she's done real well."

The Game of Bridge Reconnects Brothers in Their Alumni Years

In addition to a lifetime of service and his many lasting friendships with brothers, KA also introduced Clint to another life-long affair, bridge. In college, however, he claims he was not the card shark that he is today.

"I didn't have a clue what bridge was," Clint said. "But I watched [my brothers] play, started playing, and have played through the years since. It gives

me a good thing to pass the time and, theoretically, keeps my mind sharp."

After reconnecting at KA's 25th anniversary party, Clint met with three brothers – Paul Crawford '48, Dan McNeil '43 and Bob Rice '46 (the same guys who taught him to play all those years earlier) – and their wives once a month to play the popular card game that he learned back in school. And although Clint doesn't play bridge with them anymore, he makes it a point to keep in touch with them all.

He also makes it a point to stay in touch with **Walton Carver** of Valdosta, GA, his best friend from KA. When asked how long they have been friends, he laughed.

"We've been friends for a long time...I graduated in 1948. You do the math."

With Clint Newton's various contributions and accolades, his lasting legacy is a model for present and future KAs. His life of service to his family, community, fraternity and country are living on through his good works and his daughters. We thank and recognize Clint for exemplifying the KA spirit and enthusiasm not just for his college years, but for a lifetime.

Clint has had several health issues through the years, but is currently doing well at age 83. He lives in a condo in a senior living community.
